Jesus has two identities; first the Son of Man, and second the Son of God.

Oh no! You just told me He was the bridegroom of Blood. What's next? Divine equivocation this, divine that? Next you'll tell me there's a divine hamster.

Patience, Moe. Patience, patience, patience.... Talking about a hamster? Am I talking to one?

What are you thinking now, Moe? This is some heavy stuff. How are you going to substantiate these numbers?

Jesus came first as the Son of Man, and this genealogy is specified in Matthew 1:1-17. Divine equivocation yields the number 77 77 77.

This I have to see.

————— Son of Man Genealogy —————

Following is Matthew 1:17, (ASV). This verse separates His genealogy into three parts of 14 each.

So all the generations from Abraham unto David are fourteen generations; and from David unto the carrying away to Babylon fourteen generations; and from the carrying away to Babylon unto the Christ fourteen generations.

Ok. I see three sets of 14 generations each.

Three generations of 14 equals 7+7 three times, so Jesus' Son of Man genealogy is distilled to 77, 77, 77 with divine equivocation.
